

Congratulations on being invited to interview!

If you feel a bit nervous about what to do or what to expect, that's perfectly normal. Your interview is effectively an extension of your UCAS application. It's a chance for admissions tutors to get to know more about you, and a chance for you to get to know the university.

Know where and when you're going

Check your invitation to interview carefully. You should be given the name of the university, the name of the department, the name of the course, the name of the interviewer, the date and time of the interview, and the address of the university. If you are not sure about any of this information, contact the university by email or phone.

Quick tips
